

Each year it seems Christmas is barely in the rear-view mirror when suddenly we see Lent looming ahead. Ash Wednesday is just a month away! (March 6). The risk is that we will tumble into Lent half-aware and not really recognize it till about the third week. One way to avoid this and to make Lent really count is to engage it with other people in your family and in your parish – planning ahead.

It is likely that your parish will feature a number of opportunities for deepening your life in Christ this Lent. Be sure to watch for them and take advantage of them. Many parishes encourage small groups to meet around some combination of reflection and prayer. This is one of the best means for personal and community renewal.

If you are part of such a group or looking to form one, you may already have your resources lined up. In the event that you are looking for some good options, you are invited to consider the following five:

Blessed Are You: Living the Beatitudes, by Chris Ruff

This 6-session book for small group study is an excellent fit for the 6 weeks of Lent. Each session covers one of the Beatitudes ("Blessed are the poor in spirit, the merciful, the pure in heart," etc.) with a brief commentary and a compelling true story to help that Beatitude come to life. Like the other books in the Discipleship Series, the concise sessions are rounded out by prayer and discussion questions that apply the

How God Offers Us Guidance, by Ann and Carol Lankford

In our busy lives, prayer is seen as a luxury, when in reality, it is at the foundation of a healthy spiritual life. The Program is personal in that Fr. Toups relates personal stories to explain how to become more aware of God's presence in your life, learn how to overcome frustrations, distractions and dryness in prayer and grow in your relationship with God and those around you.
